Information for future Erasmus students

My travel tips are: If you want to travel, book your flights via Edinburgh, they are way cheaper than via Glasgow airport. From Edinburgh airport there's a very good bus connection. Generally, I would only book buses in advance via the website Megabus (9.95 pounds to Edinburgh Airport and 3.75 to

Edinburgh City Center). If you still want to travel via Glasgow, there is a transfer bus from the city center that is inexpensive.

Things to do in daily life: Lidl, Aldi and Tesco were my go-to student friendly grocery stores.

What else is important/ worth mentioning

It's definitely a different exam and grading system than what I was expecting and what I was used to.
